

STATEMENT GFSA response to latest crime statistics

Deeply concerned by significant increase in gun-related crime, and lack of attention by state to address gun violence epidemic

31 May 2023

SAPS presented the 4th quarter (January to March) 2022-23 national crime stats to the Parliamentary Portfolio Committee on Police. In addition to comparing crimes for this time period over a number of years, the latest figures also allow us to compare annual crime stats for 2022-23 with previous years.

GFSA was present during the presentation and deliberation by parliament and is deeply concerned by the lack of engagement on what will be done to address gun-related crime ins SA.

As shown in the table below: Gun-related crime has significantly increased e.g. gun-related murders have increased a staggering 35% from 23 people shot and killed a day in 2021-22 to 31 people a day in 2022-2023.

In particular GFSA has three questions for government:

- 1. Most gun crime is committed with illegal guns. What is being done to recover and destroy illegal guns and ammunition? GFSA has repeatedly called for specialised firearms units to be established to undertake the task of recovery and destruction as ordinary SAPS members don't have the skills and capacity to undertake this task.
- 2. Most if not all illegal guns in SA were once legally held before falling into criminal hands. This requires tightening controls over legal guns to stop them leaking into criminal hands. Record keeping, which is managed by the Central Firearms Registry, is a cornerstone of gun control and allows the state to know who owns what gun at any time. After years and years of corruption, incompetence and failed attempts at turnaround strategies, on 3 May 2023 the National Police Commissioner Fannie Masemola told Parliament that the State Information Technology Agency awarded a contract in relation to the Central Firearms Registry on 5 April 2023. What is the contract for? Who was awarded the contract? And what does the contract require of the service provider?
- **3.** In 2021 the Civilian Secretariat for Police Service published a draft amendment to the Firearms Control Act to align South Africa's national gun law with various constitutional and statutory requirements, when will the Firearms Control Amendment Bill be tabled?
